In our classroom discussions, the children were able to deepen their empathy, discovering that not all children have the privilege of a home to return to each night, or the love of a devoted family. I was profoundly touched when one child later approached me, contributing 20 cents from his tuck shop money to augment his earlier donation. In total, we raised an impressive \$40. Kudos to the Esslemont College community for this outstanding effort.

On Wednesday afternoon, we were honored to host Senior Constable Ethan West from Castle Hill Police Station. The children were thoroughly engaged, absorbing every word of his informative session. Topics ranged from the invaluable role of the police in our lives (keeping us safe), identifying our 'trusted' individuals (parents, grandparents, teachers, and police), to staying vigilant about stranger danger - including online encounters. The children were particularly excited to glimpse the equipment he uses, with his firearm securely in its holster, alongside his pepper spray, baton, and handcuffs. Constable West has graciously promised to return next term to engage in a game of soccer with the children during lunchtime!

Today, we wrapped up the term with a delicious sausage sizzle, expertly prepared by the children themselves. It's truly heartening to see them expanding their culinary skills and building a diverse repertoire of dishes they can confidently whip up.

## What have we been learning?

In science this week the students created their own flying insect based on the external features they had learnt about throughout the term. They then created a habitat that included the food it would need to eat, other animals and predators.

In history the students created toys from the past, based on what they have learnt over the past few lessons. These included a cup and ball, as well as a spinner. The students thoroughly enjoyed this activity.
